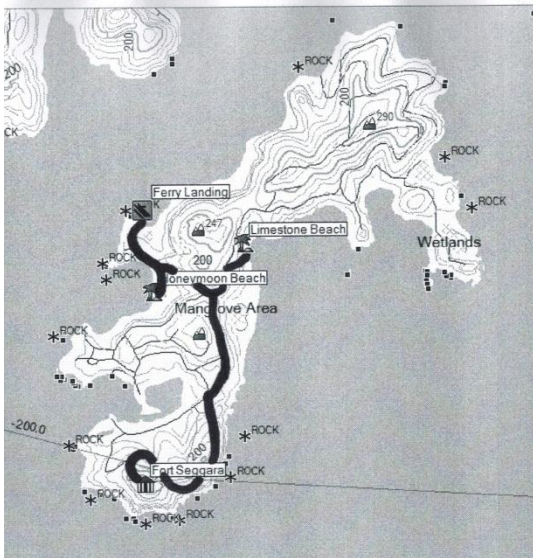




Welcome to Water Island

The Island is irregular in shape, and is about 2-1/2 statute miles long and ½ mile wide. Most visitors arrive on Water Island via the public ferry dock at Phillips’ Landing.



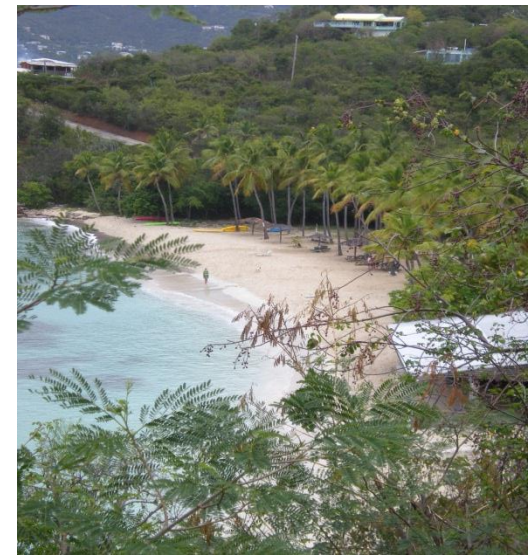

We embrace and appreciate visitors who leave only footprints on the beach and who take their trash back with them.

Our residents and live-aboard boaters are responsible pet owners who comply with Virgin Islands law. Rarely will you find an unsupervised dog running free on the beach. Swimming

At Honeymoon Beach, the swim area is clearly marked with U.S. Coast Guard registered navigation buoys. Boaters know that they are not supposed to cross these buoys. If you swim within these markings, you should be safe from any and all motorized boats also using the beach area. You certainly may swim or snorkel outside these markings as well, just be aware that you share the waters with boaters.
